

Astley Hall and Coach House Schools Programme

Information for teachers

Welcome

Astley Hall is Tudor manor house, surrounded by beautiful parkland. Built in 1578 and given to the Council in 1922, Astley Hall spans many fascinating historical periods and offers countless opportunities for learning outside the classroom. Our art gallery is home to a number of changing exhibitions each year and we encourage all schools to bring their pupils to visit to enhance Art and Design learning.

Astley Coach House contains our purpose built Activity Room for schools, as well as the Chorley Remembrance Experience; an immersive gallery based on the experiences of Chorley in the First World War and subsequent conflicts.

Astley Farmhouse is home to a variety of community groups who use our two gallery spaces to curate temporary exhibitions. The Lancashire Family History Society are based within the Farmhouse and are always happy to help with research for school projects.

We offer a variety of sessions, rooted in the local experience and linked to various aspects of the curriculum. We encourage pupils to develop skills such as historical enquiry, literacy and communication.

We can cater for all key stages and are happy to tailor sessions to suit your topic, given enough notice. Schools are welcome to combine 2 half day sessions to make up a full day.

For the majority of our sessions, the maximum number of pupils we can accommodate in one visit is 36. If you are conducting a teacher led visit and wish to bring more, this may be possible depending on the type of work you wish to do. Please ring and let us know the format of your day and any requests.

If there is a particular project your school is working on please let us know and if possible we can incorporate extra information to suit your needs.

Educational sessions KS1 and KS2



Tudor Life

Full day session 10am-2pm

£3.50 per pupil (min cost £75)

We investigate the everyday lives of rich and poor Tudors in Chorley by looking at religion, food and drink, pastimes, health and hygiene and family life. This is done through:

- A tour by the ladies of the house
- Planning a Tudor menu and quill writing
- Object investigation
- Making a Tudor “scent bag” using herbs and flowers

The Great Plague! Health and hygiene in the 17th Century

Half day session 10am-12noon

£3.00 per pupil (min cost £60)

We investigate the how healthy and hygienic the people living in the Tudor/Stuart era were. Linking to the Great Plague, we will investigate how people tried to stay healthy and hygienic using various remedies. Pupils will:

- Investigate the role of the housewife in providing herbal home remedies for health and hygiene
- Look around the Walled Garden at different herbs used in remedies
- Make their own “scent bag” to take home

Serving Stories

Full day session 10am-2pm

£3.50 per pupil (min cost £75)

Firmly rooted in Local History, pupils learn about the people who lived at Astley Hall in 1851. The house-maids take the pupils on an immersive tour as they find out what life was like for a servant at Astley Hall.

Pupils will:

- Discover more about Lady Hoghton and the 11 servants who lived at Astley Hall in 1851
- Play a game to introduce them to the various servants and jobs at Astley Hall
- Assist the servants with their domestic duties including making firelighters, folding napkins, sweeping, washing and ironing.
- Investigate Victorian toys and games and have a go.

We provide dressing up clothes for the children at the start of the day.

A Very Victorian Christmas

Seasonal session running November and December

Half day session 10am-12noon or 12.45pm-2.45pm

£4.00 per pupil

Bring your school on a trip to Astley Hall to find out more about Christmas traditions and their origins. (Fancy dress recommended!) We can accommodate up to 60 pupils per session.

The day is fast paced and packed with hands-on activities which include:

- Making Christmas cards and decorations
- Object Handling (rich/poor children's toys)
- Victorian parlour games and carol singing
- Visiting the cook as she prepares for the Christmas feast

Homes a Long Time Ago

Half day session 10am-12noon £3.00 per pupil

Aimed at KS1, this session is a gentle introduction to how people lived in the past. Pupils will:

- Look at how buildings change over time through a tour of the building and sketching activities.
- Gain insight into domestic life as they have a go at washing clothes and sweeping without washing machines and vacuums!
- Investigate objects found in an old house and guess the uses of mystery objects.

Textiles: Weaving and Dyeing

Half day session 10am-11.30am £3.00 per pupil

This session uses our 17th Century tapestries of “Jason and the Golden Fleece” as a starting point for investigating weaving and different types of materials.

The session includes:

- Investigating the history of weaving and tapestries.
- Sorting woven and non-woven fabrics
- Weaving on a small handheld loom.
- Contributing to our large tapestry on the tapestry loom.

SEN sessions

Half day session 10am-12noon £3.00 per head or minimum of £60 per session

We can adapt any of the above sessions to cater for schools who have pupils with additional requirements. Please get in touch to discuss with a member of staff. Our sessions are interactive, flexible and pupil centred.

Educational sessions for KS3 and above

We run bespoke sessions for Secondary schools and Colleges who can make use of the building and its' fantastic collections for a variety of different topics. Our collections are an excellent starting point for studying:

- Tudor life
- Civil War, Interregnum and Reformation (Astley Hall has strong links to Oliver Cromwell)
- Chorley in the 1st World War
- Bronze age
- Art and design/craftsmanship
- Local History
- Citizenship

We can assist schools by arranging access to some of our archives and collections. Please get in touch with the Astley staff to discuss your individual requirements.

Resource Boxes

We are currently developing our resource boxes that are available for schools/groups to loan. They contain a mixture of real and replica artefacts, alongside teachers notes and suggested activities. We currently offer boxes on the subject of:

- Chorley's War- A look at the 1st World War and the Chorley Pals
- Feast!- Created to help schools set up their own Medieval/Tudor feast in their classrooms

Temporary Exhibitions

We are happy to accommodate school visits to our temporary art exhibitions within Astley Hall as well as the Chorley Remembrance Experience in the Coach House. Important Information for your visit

Facilities and accessibility

We can provide a room for the children to have lunch. Please help us to keep this room tidy as other people may have to use this room later the same day.

Inside the hall we have one male and one female toilet. There are additional toilets in the Coach House and outside toilets at the Farmhouse.

The ground floor of the museum is accessible for wheelchair users. The upper floors are only accessible by stairs as Astley Hall is a Grade 1 listed building. Please let us know of any wheelchair users when enquiring about a visit so activities on the ground floor can be arranged.

Goody bags

We can provide pre-made gift bags of £1, £2 or £3 value. These will be handed out at the end of the day and added to the invoice for the visit.

Safety

We have a generic schools risk assessment that will be sent out with your confirmation email, to go alongside your own risk assessment. We recommend teachers do a preliminary visit.

There is ample parking for the coaches in the Astley Village car park. Please be aware of delivery trucks and other motor vehicles whose drivers are not expecting to come into contact with groups of school children.

Payment

Chorley Council will invoice the school after your visit. There is no need to bring any money on the day.

We have to charge VAT for schools who have opted out of LEA control and for independent schools.

How to find us

Chorley is easy to find -just off junction 8 of the M61. From there follow the many brown tourist road signs to Astley Hall, which is to the west of Chorley town centre off the A581 Chorley-Southport Road.

We are also only a 15 minute drive from junction 27 of the M6, simply follow the A49 Preston route until you see the brown signs at the village of Euxton. Parking for cars and coaches is available in the Astley Village car park to the rear of Astley Hall.
